## 70 YEARS OF LITTLE

There has been discussion for some time on the possibility of celebrating the seventieth anniversary of the Little Forks congregation. At the annual meeting, Nov. 12, 1947, it was decided to observe the anniversary in the summer of 1948. Olaf Ringerud was elected chairman of the History committee. Others on the committee have been Mrs. Emma Gunderson, Anton Jemtrud, Peter Boe

Gathering historical records and pictures for a seventy year period is never an easy matter. There had not in all these years been any official gathering of historical data for such an event as we now contemplated. However, we are thankful for the complete record of secretary's minutes of all business sessions and the faithful entry of ministerial acts in the official records kept by the pastors. Most of these records are in the Norwegian language but as long as we have those who know well

both languages we will not be separated from this rich historical treasure.

It is hoped that this study and the interest evidenced by all in this anniversary would lead us also to think of the proposed Diamond Jubilee. It is not too early to

begin now to make plans for this event.

As we today remember the founders of the congregation and read the record of its early beginnings, let us thank God for all their efforts in establishing and maintaining the Church of Jesus Christ that it might be here for us. Also let us pray that God might find us faithful that the Word of the Lord might be proclaimed to our generation.

If the Lord shall yet withhold the great harvest many things lie before us. Our first concern is for the souls of our people and their worship of the one, true God. We recognize the great challenge of the Church in the open country, which in such a large measure provides for the growth of both city and country congregations. Many of our young people will leave us to make their contribution elsewhere. We send them on with God's blessing, but first, through the power of the Word of God, we would plant their feet firmly upon the rock, which is Jesus Christ. There are plans, too, for extensive repair and improvement of our church plant in the next three or four years.

The work of building the Kingdom of God is to continue as long as the time of grace remains. We do not only think about the past today. An anniversary also directs us to look forward. May we continue to hear the Word that was read when this congregation came into being, "Arise, shine; for thy light is come . . ."

### Through the Years

The Little Forks Congregation was organized December 28, 1877. This organization meeting was held at the Fingal Enger home with Patsor Hagboe, Erick Nyhus, Torgrim Olson Fecher, Johan Olson, Ellef P. Nyhus, Sevat Swenson, Kolbjorn Olson Liedvalen, Amund Amundson, Bern't Johanson, Gunder H. Stavens, Helge Nilson and Fingal Enger present. The meeting opened with the reading of the first three

verses of the sixtieth chapter of Isaiah,

Arise, shine; for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee. For, behold, the darkness shall cover the earth, and gross darkness the peop'e: but the Lord shall rise upon thee, and His glory shall be seen upon thee. And the Gentiles shall come to thy light, and kings to the brightness of

After hearing God's Word, Pastor Hagboe led in prayer.

At this first meeting a constitution of ten paragraphs was drawn up and adopted. The constitution provided that there should be three trustees,

two deacons, a secretary, a treasurer and an advisor. The following were elected: as president, Pastor Hagboe; secretary, Helge Nilson; treasurer, Ellef P. Nyhus; as trustees, Sevat Swenson for one year, Gunder Hanson Stavens for two years and Fingal Enger for three years; as deacons, Kjolborn Olson Livedalen and Torgrim Olson Fecher; and as advisor, Ellef P. Nyhus. The name of the congregation was to be The Aadalen Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Congregation of Traill County, Dakota Territory.

Eight Sunday services and four week day services

Since the congregation had no church building as yet, services were held in the homes of members and in the school house. Less than three months after the organization meeting the

congregation held a special meeting and changed the name of the congregation to The Little Forks Norwegian Evangelical the congregation, Traill County, Dakota Territory.

On December 12, 1881, Anders Anderson Heslien donated

two zeres of land in Enger Township for a cemetery plot. two seres of land in English Township for a cemetery piot.
The cemetery was formally dedicated January 21, 1883. A.

A. Heslein was the first caretaker. It was decided at the annual meeting November 13, 1993, to erect the church building at this site. The building was to be 50 feet by 32 feet and 20 feet high. The following were elected to serve on the Building Committee: Fingal Enger, Ole Haakenson, Paul Boe, Sevat Swenson, Andrew Stavens, Ole Gronbeck, Erick Nyhus and Elias Kekken. Daniel Bjerke and Peter Wold were secured as carpenters and building was begun in 1884, but because of hard times and early fall work it was not completed until the spring of 1885. However, the annual meeting was held in the new Church building November 12, 1884. The first janitor was Ellef P. Nyhus, assisted by Sevat Swenson. Nils Rodningen was an early "Kirke sanger."

In 1891 the Ladies Aid donated an organ and bell. Haukom was the first organist. After a short time Olat Haakenson replaced him. The salary of the organist was \$1 per

The first Confirmation was held May 23, 1880. The followservice. ing were confirmed: Nils Anderson Heslien, Helge Amundson, Ole Olson Haagenson, Carl Olson, Nils Olaus Olson, Anders Anderson Heslein, Halvor Christofferson, Ragnild Amundson, Sigrid Anderson and Ingeborg Nilsen. The first baptism recorded is that of Johanna, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Boe, who was baptized May 26, 1878 by Pastor B. L. Hagboe. The first marriage recorded is that of Erik Pederson Nyhus and

Anna Olson. They were married July 28, 1878. The first death was that of Ingeborg Helgeson Nelson, who died July 23, 1881, and was buried July 25, 1881.

One of the early visiting missionary pastors in the community was the Reverend Peter Nykreim, who was ordained in 1875. However, the Reverend Bern-

hard L. Hagboe was the first paster of Little Forks congregation. There were fourteen services the first year, that is, in 1878, which was two more than the number which had previously been set as a minimum. It is to be remembered that Pastor Hagboe was a home missionary seeking to establish further In 1880 he left to go to Brookings, S. Dal:

gation in the summer of 1894. Pastor Tollefson remained for 18 years, leaving in the spring of 1905, and going to Banks, N. Dak., to do missionary

work and engage in farming.

In July of 1905 Pastor A. J. Eikeland came directly from Luther Theological Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., to become the pastor of Little Forks and Goose River congregations. Pastor Eikeland spent his entire ministry in these congregations, also serving Washington Prairie which was added in 1920. In these 35 years from 1905 to 1940 we have half of the history of the congregation to date.

According to the records there was a meeting at the Little Forks Church, March 24, 1899, concerning the parsonage. A committee was elected to work with the committee from the Goose River congregation. The parsonage was built sometime in 1899. The present parsonage in Hatton was purchased in

Various improvements were made on the church building from time to time. In 1914 the chapel was extended at a cost of \$1,079.50. In 1939 the church was redecorated and improvements made on the kitchen. Again in 1947 substantial im-

provements were made on the chapel.

Pastor Eikeland resigned in 1939 but continued to serve until the summer of 1940. Mrs. Eikeland had gone on to her reward three years earlier. She died December 14, 1936, after 32 years of faithful service beside her husband in the Lord's work in the congregation. Her remains lie in the Little Forks cemetery. One son, Fridtjof, is in the ministry, a paster at Warren, Minn., another son, Ansgar, lives at Arthur, N. Dak. Two daughters also live in Minnesota: Mildred, at Hastings, is engaged in teaching, and Freida, Minnearolis, is employed by Augsburg Publishing House. Pastor A. J. Eikeland now lives at the Home for the Aged at Grand Forks, N. Dak.

Upon the resignation of Pastor Eikeland a call was extended to Pastor K. C. Grundahl, Robinson, Kansas. Pastor Grundahl and his two young sons, Gordon and Allan, came to be with us in the early part of July in 1940. Installation services were held Sunday, July 7, with Pastor Eikeland as the installing

officer. On June 6, 1943, Pastor Grundahl was married to Miss Alice Naas, instructor in music and nursing at Concordia Miss Alice Naas, instructor in music and nursing at Concordia Miss Alice Naas, Minn. They labored earnestly in the Lord's College, Moorhead, Minn. They labored earnestly in the Lord's work in our midst until the fall of 1946 when Pastor Grundahl was called to be an instructor at the Camrose Bible School and was called to be an instructor at the Camrose Bible School and to serve a parish at Camrose, Alberta, Canada. His farewell to serve a preached on New Year's Day, 1947.

Pastor Alford E. Setness, Buffalo, S. Dak., was then called to become the pastor of Little Forks, Goose River and Washington Prairie congregations. He accepted early in January and promised to come about May 1. Pastor and Mrs. setness and family arrived April 30 and Mr. Setness was installed by District President David Stoeve May 4, 1947.





The early records of the church activities of the Ladies Aid of the congregation have been destroyed. We can depend on the oral reports of our Pioneer Mothers, who took an active part in the work, and welfare of the church at home, and on the mission field.

When Hol congregation mentions a Ladies Aid being organized in 1877 with Rev. Hagboe, pastor, and that later a sale of different articles made by the ladies was held at the Fingal Enger home, we know that the ladies of this community had contributed their share of the work.

In 1884 there was a formal organization of the Little Forks Ladies Aid at the home of Ellef P. Nyhus, with the following elected as officers: Mrs. Paul Boe, president; Mrs. Ole Haakenson, secretary; Mrs. Rev. Waage, treasurer.

The Ladies Aid held monthly meetings and often an all day session, when the President would cut out men's shirts and other garments to be sewed there, or to be taken home and finished.


At first dinners or lunches were served free by the hostess to everybody present. The midday meal consisting of meat and potatoes, lefse, flatbrod, speite kjod, ost, rommegrod, bread and butter. Also sandwiches, takkels and several kinds of rich layer cakes were served for lunch.

In 1895 at one of the meetings, Mrs. Kjolborn Livedalen put a glass in the center of the table and said "From now on we contribute ten cents to the Aid for our lunch."

Once a year the finished articles were sold. Part of the

money was used to pay for the materials used, the rest was used for the home church missions and charities.

The first item bought was the church bell which still hangs in the belfry. It calls us to worship in the Little Forks Church

on all religious occasions.

On July 27, 1900, when a cyclone completely destroyed the first church the bell was later found undamaged in the cemetery, and when the present church was erected the following year the bell was again put to use.

Our church bell stands as a monument commemorating the

work of our Pioneer Mothers.

In the secretary's report for the congregation for May 27, 1885, we find the congregation borrowed money from the Ladies Aid to defray expenses of the church building.

Down through the years the Ladies Aid has done its share in building up the church as it stands today. Lesides it has contributed liberally to Missions and Charities.

In the fall of 1942 the Ladies Aid joined 'the Women's Missionary Federation.

As charter members of the Little Forks Ladies Aid, these can be named; but there may have been many more: Mrs. Rev. Waage; Mrs. Ellef P. Nyhus; Mrs. Per Nyhus; Mrs. Erick Nyhus; Mrs. Fingal Enger; Mrs. Sevat Swenson; Mrs. Kolbjorn Livedahlen; Mrs. Andrew Stavens; Mrs. Gunder Stavens; Mrs. Amund Amundson; Mrs. Ole Haakenson; and Mrs. Paul Boe.






gathering at the parsonage December 30, 1947.
